SIXTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Wisdom 12:13, 16-19

For though you are the master of might, you judge with clemency. This passage from the Book of Wisdom addresses itself to God, giving praise and thanksgiving for his mercy.

Second Reading: Romans 8:26-27

For we do not know how to pray as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes with inexpressible groanings. Paul indicates that since people are, in general, unaccustomed to the manner of praying, of speaking directly to God, the Holy Spirit will intercede for them.

Gospel: Matthew 13:24-43

The Kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed ...

According to Matthew, Jesus speaks of the "reign of God" in three parables: the man who soweth good seed, the mustard seed, and the yeast. In each parable, Jesus demonstrates that once the "reign of God" had been established, it grew and spread.

HIS WORD TODAY by Rev. William J. Reilly Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

"The Spirit comes to the aid of our weakness, for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes with inexpressible groaning. And the one who searches hearts knows what is the intention of the Spirit. But though you are master of might you judge with great clemency and with much lenience you govern us...and you taught that those who are just must be kind."

Do I understand that when I decide 'I am going to pray' that this is a response to the movement of the Spirit? When I pause to pray or plea, to thank or speak my words do I recognize the aid of that same Spirit? Paul helps us understand what sparks our prayer. Remember the prayer poem 'Lovely lady dressed in blue, teach me how to pray.'

I might also find strength knowing that my intentions are good and positive as I pause and pray for others. I am concerned about their well being, their peace and happiness. I want to be free of judging others, as God judges me with clemency and wants me as a just person to be kind.

There are many helps for our prayer life in the readings of scripture today.




Jesus' parables show

THE SAINTS - PART TWO

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, "the witnesses who have preceded us into the kingdom, especially those whom the Church recognizes as saints, share in the living tradition of prayer by the example of their lives, the transmission of their writings, and their prayer today. They contemplate God, praise him and constantly care for those whom they have left on earth. When they entered into the joy of their Master, they were 'put in charge of many things.' Their intercession is their most exalted service to God's plan. We can and should ask them to intercede for us and the whole world." CCC 2683.

"...So by their fraternal concern is our weakness greatly helped.

Do not weep, for I shall be more useful to you after my death and I shall help you then more effectively than during my life. I want to spend my heaven in doing good on earth." CCC 956.

Following are saints whose feast days we celebrate this week.

<u>July 25 – St. James, apostle, martyr</u> (first century). Patron saint of Spain and of pilgrims. James, son of Zebedee, was a fisherman with his brother John. The brothers must have shared a fiery temperament, since Jesus calls them "sons of thunder." The brothers were close to the Lord, being present at the raising of Jairus' daughter, at the transfiguration, and in the Garden of Gethsemane. As with most of the other apostles, there is no account of his activities after the resurrection. He is known as James the Greater, to distinguish him from the other apostle of the same name. May we imitate his eagerness to follow Jesus and change our lives in order to make this happen.

<u>July 26 – Sts. Joachim and Ann</u> (parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary). St. Ann is the patroness of homemakers, housewives, mothers and children. St. Joachim is the patron of fathers and grandfathers.

The gospels tell us nothing about Mary's parents, not even their names. What we know from Christian tradition is found in non-scriptural writings such as the Protogospel of James. Devotion to St. Anne existed in sixth-century Constantinople and eighth-century Rome. By the sixteenth century this feast day was universal. Joachim has been honored in the East from the earliest days, but in the West only since the sixteenth century. May we imitate their examples as loving parents and do all we can so that children might flourish as Mary did.

<u>July 29 – St. Martha</u> (first century). Patroness of housewives and of waiters and waitresses.

Martha, the sister of Mary and Lazarus, lived in Bethany. Martha is a model of hospitality as well as of fidelity in her discipleship. When Jesus came to raise Lazarus from the dead, it was Martha who went out to meet him and confess her belief that he was the Christ, the Son of God. May we imitate her care for others' needs and her trust in Jesus' power to give new life.
