HIS WORD TODAY by Rev. William J. Reilly Twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Forgive your neighbor's injustices, then when you pray, your own sins will be forgiven. Could anyone nourish anger against another and expect healing from the Lord? Could anyone refuse mercy to another like himself can he seek pardon for his own sins?... Remember your last days, set enmity aside, remember death and decay, and cease from sin. Think of the commandments hate not your neighbor, remember the Most High's covenant and overlook faults."

When we consider the word power, we might think of electricity, strength, or brute force. The greatest power available is not material, physical or even emotional. The greatest power resides in every person, yet often goes unused.

The scriptures today reflect that power and it is found in the word forgiveness. Every person has the power to forgive. In our world beset with hatred, war, and discrimination rarely do we resort to the use of this power. We are set on dominating, getting even, putting others in their place. We judge, presume intentions and motivation, yet fail to see the splinter in our own eye. The power to forgive is a gift for use, for my own well-being and for others.

I recall a wise old priest who directed others to 'look the other way'.

## TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

### First Reading: Sirach 27:30—28:7

Sirach advises all to forgive the faults of their neighbor. Only by forgiving the sins of others, can a person expect to be forgiven his sins.

### **Second Reading: Romans 14:7-9**

Paul stresses that no one is his own master; we are responsible to the Lord, and we belong to him in both life and death.

### **Gospel: Matthew 18:21-35**

This narrative points out the difference between mercy and justice. When Peter asks how often he should forgive someone who wrongs him, Jesus answers, "...not seven times: I say seventy times seven times." Jesus then narrates the story of the king who was merciful to his official by forgiving him all his debts, but this same official showed no mercy to his own servant.

### This week, we celebrate the feast days of two important saints: St. Matthew from the first century, and St. Padre Pio from the twentieth century.

### St. Matthew - Apostle, Evangelist. September 21

"As Jesus passed on from there, he saw a man called Matthew sitting at the tax office; and he said to him, 'Follow me.' And he rose and followed him." -- Matthew 9:9

This brief verse supplies the extent of our knowledge of the disciple traditionally identified as Matthew the Evangelist. Was he a tax collector, as the parallel texts in Mark and Luke indicate? If so he would have been despised by his fellow Jews and a collaborator with the Roman occupation. It was for consorting with such public sinners that Jesus himself earned certain disapproval. But whatever Matthew's former life, he apparently recognized that in order to follow Jesus, he must leave the past behind.

In Gospel according to Matthew, it is likely that Matthew wrote for a community accustomed to affluence. His Gospel extols an attitude of spiritual poverty and counsels his readers that their salvation depends on the quality of their mercy toward the poor. All this is certainly consistent with the attitude of a reformed tax collector.

Called in his own life to follow Jesus, he closes his Gospel with Jesus' Great Commission to his followers, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations," and concludes with the words that speak to our time and every time: "And lo, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

### St. Padre Pio – Capuchin Friar and Mystic (1887-1968). September 23

Padre Pio was forced to carry a double cross. He bore the painful, bleeding wounds that marked his body with the passion of Christ, and at the same time, he endured the burden that came from being popularly acclaimed a living saint.

Like his spiritual father St. Francis, Padre Pio was a stigmatic. He bore on his hands, feet, and side the wounds of Christ's sufferings. These mysterious open wounds, for which no natural explanation could be determined, appeared on his body in 1910. They remained until some months before his death, over fifty years later, continuously bleeding and causing great suffering. He was credited with literally thousands of miracles, including such feats as restoring sight to a man born with no pupils. As a confessor, he was said to have the gift of "reading hearts," knowing the secrets of penitents whom he had not previously met.

Padre Pio was capable of extraordinary prophecies. In 1947, when he heard the confession of a young Polish priest, Karol Wojtyla, he made the astonishing declaration that this priest would one day be Pope. Padre Pio was declared a saint on June 16, 2002 by Pope John Paul II, the very same priest he predicted would be Pope!

"I need to love You more and more, but I don't have any more love in my heart. I have given all my love to You. If You want more, fill my heart with Your love, and then oblige me to love You more and I will not refuse You."
