 - Raining 40 days and 40 nights Noah's Ark
 - The Jews wandered through the desert for 40 years
 - Our Lord fasted and prayed in the desert for 40 days
 - 40 hours is the traditional time from Christ's burial to His resurrection
 - Our Lord ascended into Heaven 40 days after Resurrection
- Monstrance A sacred and beautiful vessel in which the consecrated Host is carried in procession and exposed for Adoration
- Adoration A period of time in which believers (adorers) unite in spending time before the Blessed Sacrament; during 40 Hours an adorer is need at all hours, night or day to ensure that a believer is there to answer Jesus' plea, Could you not watch for me one brief hour? (Matt 26:40)

MAP Testing

Next Tuesday and Wednesday, students grades K-8 will be administered their fall MAP Test English Language Arts. These scores will provide a baseline for performance in reading. Progress in reading will be monitored throughout the year and progress goals set based upon students' scores next week. A second MAP test will be taken in the winter and a final one in May. Please ensure that your child gets a good night's rest and a healthy breakfast on these days.

Future Scientists

Our students have been hard at work in their Science classes learning about heat and light, erosion and the reaction of yeast and sugar.







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Preschool

- Students will work with identifying the letters C and D and their sounds.
- Students will practice how to write the letters C and D.
- Students will learn the numbers 3 and 4.
- Students will practice how to write the numbers 3 and 4.
- Students will learn and practice the Sign of the Cross.
- Students will learn about the Mass and take a tour of the Church.

Kindergarten

- Students will be introduced to the Bible and Bible stories.
- Students will continue to study energy in Science.
- Students will study numbers 0-20 in Math.
- Students will work with identifying letters and sounds.
- Students will practice with commonly used sight words and features of print.

Grade 1

- Students will understand how energy affects air.
- Students will be able to use number bonds to show parts and whole. This is a great strategy for addition and subtraction.
- Students will be able to read, write and spell CVC words with the short i sound. They will be able to read, write and spell the "red words" to, it, at, has and an. Students will continue to work on proper letter formation.
- Students will continue to practice the Sign of the Cross and explore the Creation story.

Grade 2

- Religion: We will learn stories of the Old Testament, and about the life of Christ.
- **Reading:** We will read stories to compare and contrast characters and events, as well as understand the author's purpose.
- Writing: We will be editing our true stories!
- **Grammar:** We will begin to learn how to identify complete sentences, and to identify which type of sentences we are reading (statement, question, or demand).
- Math: We will begin chapter 2 to practice addition up to 1000.
- Science: We will consider how energy affects air.

Grade 3

- **Religion** Students will learn about gifts from God. They will be tested on Chapters 1 and 2.
- Reading Students will learn to analyze characters through reading a realistic fiction story called Destiny's Gift.
- English Students will focus on identifying nouns.
- **Writing** Students will continue working on their descriptive paragraphs and learn how to add dialogue to their writing.
- *Math* Students will add numbers up to 10,000 using regrouping.
- **Science** Students will consider energy related to weather events and their causes as they create hot air balloons.
- Social Studies Students will continue learning about the 7 continents and 5 oceans.

Grade 4

- **Religion** Students will learn how God speaks to us through the Church. We will also do a review of the first three chapters.
- Language Arts We will be reading The Chocolate Touch and focusing on prefixes, base words and suffixes.
- **Science** Students will take their unit 1 vocabulary test on 9/12, practice how to use scientific tools, and prepare for their first unit test.
- **Math** Students will read, write, add, subtract, and compare whole numbers to 1,000,000 and take their chapter 1 test. Students will begin to round and estimate numbers.
- **Social Studies** Students will continue to learn about the first settlers in Ohio and the conflict over the land.

Grade 5

- **Religion** Students will learn about the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation.
- Language Arts We will be reading Frindle and starting our vocabulary book, Wordly Wise.
- **Science** Students continue their study of the sun and celestial bodies that orbit the sun taking time out to create two-stage balloon rockets.
- Math (Scheidel) Students will compare and multiply whole numbers.
- Math (Musselman) Students will be comparing, rounding and estimating numbers
- Social Studies Students will learn how people from Europe became a part of the United States.

<u>Grade 6</u>

- Religion Students will be learning about our classroom saint, Saint Bernardine of Siena.
- *English* Students will be studying word roots (tract, vinc/vince), and "C" idioms.
- Reading Students will begin reading "A Long Walk to Water".
- **Science** Students will end a unit on Science, Technology, and Engineering and begin a unit on Earth's resources.
- *Math (Scheidel)* Students will understand squares, square roots, cubes, and cube roots, and take their chapter 1 test.
- *Math (Wispé)* Students will learn about prime factorization, factors, multiples, squares, square roots, cubes, and cube roots. Students will take their chapter 1 test.
- **Social Studies** Students will be studying the Stone Ages and Early Cultures.

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Grade 7

- Religion Students will learn about who Jesus was and the world He lived in.
- **English** Students will continue a grammar unit on the sentence.
- **Reading** Students will be reading short stories from their *Collections* textbook and focusing on the elements of plot and making inferences.
- Science Students will begin a unit on Earth's water.
- Math (Wispé) Students will finish learning about the real number system and take a test on chapter
- Math (Scheidel) Students will understand the real number system and take their chapter 1 test.
- Social Studies Students will be learning about New Empires in the Americas.

Grade 8

- **Religion** Students will be learning about the structure of the Catholic Liturgy. They will also be learning about the items used during Mass.
- **English** Students will work with complements within clauses.
- Reading Students will continue to read personal essays/narratives and begin writing their own.
- Science Students will continue to study how Earth's surface is shaped by erosion and deposition.
- **Math (Poux)** Students will finish learning the rules for exponents and then work with squared and cubed numbers. Students can expect a chapter 1 test at the end of the week of 10/1.
- *Math (Scheidel)* Students will continue learning all the exponent rules.
- **Social Studies** Students will continue to study the buildup to the Civil War 1840s-1850s.
