



Christmas Symbols

Gifts

Giving gifts is a ritual directly from the Bible. We give each other gifts because God set out to give us the gifts of creation, His Son and Himself. When we see Christmas presents they remind us of the most precious gift God granted us – the way to Heaven through Jesus. And like the 3 Wise Men who broughtJesus gold, frankincense, and myrth we, too, give gifts to each other.

Christmas Tree

The tree is an evergreen — it does not die or fade away or lose its needles in winter. In this sense they have come to represent the immortality of the Resurrected Christ.

Lights

Originally lights were candles – meant to symbolize Christ, his self-giving love and gift of life to us. The candle provides light and warmth as it consumes its own substance, the wax. So, too, Jesus gave his own substance – his life – so that we might find Divine Light. And when we have found Divine Light for ourselves, we, too, are enabled through the power of the Holy Spirit to give ourselves to others. Christmas is the feast of Love, where we share gifts with each other as Christ shared the gift of life with us.

Christmas Wreath

Like the Christmas tree, the wreath is made from an evergreen, symbolizing our everlasting life in Christ. In addition, this round, a circle with no beginning and no end, reminding us of God, who is eternal, never beginning or ending.

Christmas Carols

Carols are said to have begun back in the 13th century. Some believe that songs have been sung at the darkest time of the year—the Winter Solstice-for thousands of years in order to bring light to the season and celebrate the turn towards longer days. Some originated as stories, prayers, poems and chants. They symbolize everything that Christmas stands for.

Angels

In Greek, the word 'angel' means messenger. Angels are the messengers of God, who played a prominent part in the birth of Jesus. They are personified as Heavenly creatures with wings that symbolize immortality, virtue, peace, love, and innocence, while the halo is the symbol of their native to Heaven. Angels are believed to be immortal, who live in Heaven, and act as intermediaries between God and humankind.

Bells

Bells act as a medium between Heaven and Earth, and their clappers represent communication between humans and God. The sound of the bells announces the birth of Christ on Earth.

Stan

The Christmas Star represents the Star of Bethlehem which was the beacon of light for the Wise Men to find Jesus.
